The thing he loves most about travel is the opportunity to grow by getting out of our comfort zones. He's learned that upon returning from a destination, we are never the same person we were when we left. Ryan holds a Ph.D. in Natural Resources from the University of Missouri and an M.S. in Biology from Ball State University.

Roman's semester study abroad in Chile proved to be a career defining experience. In particular the inequality he saw throughout Latin America led in him to a desire to contribute to the sustainable development of the region. He conducted research on income inequality in Argentina and, after taking courses on sustainable tourism back at the University of Colorado, he received a Fulbright Grant to research tourism growth in Nicaragua. After his research project, through which he became a proponent of tourism-driven sustainable development, he co-founded Comunidad Connect, a nonprofit that funds community work by hosting groups of students and volunteers. Having seen the positive impact that sustainable tourism and study abroad can have on rural



BELIZE


Marine **Ecosystems**

Subject areas:

Marine Biology, Biology, Ecology, Environmental Science

Summary

The Belize Barrier Reef boasts over 100 types of coral and nearly 500 species of tropical fish over its 190 miles, making it Belize's top tourist destination and vital to the country's fishing industry. Through conversations with local experts, hands-on activities, and educational tours, students will learn about the marine ecosystem conservation, as well as the country's diverse cultural heritage, unique geography, and complicated history.

Cultural Identity Before & After Colonization

Subject areas:

History, Anthropology, Archeology

Summary

This weeklong itinerary explores the colonial and post-colonial histories in the context of Belize's complex and diverse cultural identity. Your students will immerse themselves in Garifuna culture through experiences ranging from drummaking to coconut processing, and learn the way of life and history of this unique Indigenous group. Additionally, students will explore the Xunantunich Mayan ruins, considered to be one of the largest Maya cities ever built, with a Mayan guide. The group will experience ways that several different populations, ethnicities and identities have made Belize what it is today.

This program is designed to complement international business and supply chain management courses. Students will travel to Florianopolis, Brazil to visit four businesses with international supply chains, participate in a service learning project, and experience a dance class and a tour of the island of Florianopolis.

The Cut Flower Business

Subject areas:

International Business, Entrepreneurship, Horticulture

Summary

This is a community-based study abroad program designed to expose students to entrepreneurship and supply chain management in Colombia's rapidly growing cut flower industry. Students will meet with small and medium scale growers to learn about the culture and industry of flowers in Colombia. Cultural and historical exploration of Bogota and Medellin compliment the itinerary.


COLORADO USA **Sports** Management


Subject areas:

Summary

This six-day program is meant to provide a fieldbased overview of the components of the sports management profession, using Denver and Colorado Springs as the setting. Students will visit several sports arenas at the professional, minor, and collegiate levels. They will also visit the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, and attend a professional sporting event. Students will also have a chance to explore some of the best places in Colorado's foothills as well as downtown Denver. Along the way the group will hear from experts in different niches of the sports management profession.



CUBA

How Race, Nature and Medicine Intersect

Subject areas:

Health, Religion, History, Sociology

Summary

This weeklong itinerary explores alternative and traditional medicine in Cuba in the context of its multicultural heritage. Herbal medicine is an integral

part of Santeria and other Afro-Cuban religions practiced on the island. Students will learn about Afro-Cuban traditions and practices through visits to community projects and temples, as well as conversations and workshops with healers and herbalists. They will also meet with someone from a community of people who cure themselves only with local water. They will meet with medical students in an informal setting and visit a medicinal farm. At the end of the week the group will not only gain authentic insight to the Cuban way of life, its diverse culture, and storied history, but also understand how alternative and traditional medicine plays an important role in everyday life in Cuba.

Diversity and Health


Subject areas:

Nursing, Pre-med, Sociology, Economics, Public health

Summary

This program explores the diversity of factors that affect Ecuadorians' health and access to health services. Through visits to health facilities and traditional medicine centers, and conversations with health professionals and local healers, students will be able to compare health factors, perceptions and experiences in Ecuador with those in the US.

Travel to Otavalo, visit famous artisan markets, meet with a traditional medicine man at an 'intercultural' clinic

Meet with Afro-Ecuadorian women's community tourism association, hike and traditional lunch, workshop on medicinal plants and their use

Hike at a beautiful lake, return to Quito

Visit the equator monument, relax in mountain hot springs, farewell dinner

FRANCE

Hidden Capital and Resources of a Port City


Subject areas:

International Relations. History, Economics

Summary

This program in Marseille, France explores the present day and historical importance of Marseille, a port on the Mediterranean and a destination for immigrants. Immigration and international commerce have largely defined Marseille historically and into the present day, however a recent declaration as a cultural capital of Europe and an influx of development money is changing the city in a way that benefits

some of its residents more than others. Students will appreciate this dynamic, visit a variety of sights related to these course themes, and meet with many people who will share their perspective on the uniqueness of Marseille and the challenges it faces. The program concludes with a day trip to the pleasant coastal town of Cassis, and special interactions with two of Marseille's young hip hop artists.

Legacies of Resistance



Summary

This program will provide firsthand insight into the history of the African Diaspora in Jamaica. Students will visit Maroon communities, stay with homestay families, and visit important cultural and historical sites. Students will gain valuable insight into the successful resistance to colonialism as well as modern day resilience to challenges faced by the people of Jamaica.

Summary

Through educational site visits and tours, students will learn about Martinique's cultural history and the impact of slavery on the island, as well as the influence and dependency that tourism has brought to its population. Students will have the opportunity to practice French with native speakers on a daily basis, connect with community volunteering at a food bank, and enjoy the adventure and beauty to be experienced on the Island of Flowers.





The Challenges of Migration

Subject areas:

History, political science, archeology

Summary

Oaxaca is one of the most ethnically diverse states in the country and an excellent field-based case study of migration, diversity, and culture. A high number of Oaxacans travel to the United States, and the city is also on the migration route from Central and South America. Students will learn about the local culture and history, dive deep into the topic of migration, and also have the opportunity to enjoy Oaxaca's unforgettable natural, historical and gastronomical attractions.

NEW ORLEANS, USA

Social Memory and Politics of the Past

Subject areas:

Sociology, anthropology, history

Summary

During this 8-day itinerary in New Orleans, your students will explore the topic of social memory in the context of monuments, the history of slavery and the civil war, geography, and music. In addition to museum visits and educational tours, your students will meet with stakeholders representing very different viewpoints on the highly controversial topic of monument relocation.

Sociology, political science, history

Summary

The group will visit iconic, historic, and otherwise important sites in New York City over the course of one week, focusing conceptually on the interaction of power and symbol. Starting with sites related to the

area's original inhabitants, and progressing to explore the history of immigrants and African Americans in New York, students will gain insight to the many layers of complexity in York's social fabric and its "creation myth." Art, memorial, and theater play an important role in this conceptual journey. Meetings with contemporary artists and college peers will likely prove to be the highlights of the visit.

Summary

This program in rural Nicaragua gives students the opportunity to learn about sustainable, organic coffee farming. Students will spend the week with the women of the Nuevo Amanacer or "New Dawn" Women's Coffee Cooperative. Students will learn about every step of the coffee cultivation process as well as the strengths and challenges of direct trade. Additionally, students will learn recent and colonial Nicaraguan history through visits to Esteli and Granda.

Subject areas:

Sustainable design and development, sustainability management, environmental studies

Summary

This program in rural Panama gives students the opportunity to learn about sustainable construction through hands-on projects led by Panamanian hosts and a local Peace Corps volunteer. Students also tour several examples of sustainable architecture, visit the Panama Canal, and enjoy undeveloped beaches and time in Panama City's historic city center.

- Work with community to construct a sustainable home in a day
- Visit sites of architectural significance and meet with architects
- Enjoy the beach, surf, and fishing
- · Learn about permaculture and sustainable agriculture

Panama has numerous indigenous tribes, some of which have embraced or are in the process of embracing tourism as a source of sustainable revenue. This program will introduce students to the immense potential as well as the challenges of this sector. Students will learn from established indigenous community-based tourism providers and complete a service learning project to support an emerging project. The experience will be an unforgettable cultural exchange contributing to economic development and environmental and cultural conservation in Panama.

Introduction to Biology



Summary

Ecuador is a country of staggering diversity with 14 indigenous groups each with its own language and traditions that often include traditional medicine and spiritual healing. Miami is the city in the US with the largest gap between the rich and the poor, and is a fascinating case study for a program focused on diversity and social determinants of health. This virtual program will introduce students to the variety of factors that influence health outcomes whilst learning about cultural diversity, differences between public and private healthcare, and environmental elements.
